IOWA HUSKER WINS

Shucks More Than 30 Bushels of Corn in 80 Minutes

NORTON, Kas., Nov. 14 (AP)—Fred Stanek, 30-year-old Iowa farmer, sped through a dusty Kansas corn field today into his fourth national husking championship. Stanek didn't mind the dust. He proved it by shucking a net load of 30.34 bushels in the 80-minute contest.

In previous years he has conquered other handicaps imposed by nature. With a blither wind in his face and icy blades cutting his gloves, Stanek stripped ice-laden stalks at Winnebago, Minn., in 1927 and won. He conquered a sudden and snow-covered field near Fremont, Neb., in 1928 to carry away a cup and \$100. He captured first honors in the agricultural classic when it opened in 1924.

The net load of the Fort Dodge farmer, 2,123.8 pounds, was 280 pounds short of the national record.

at prices far in excess of prices at which Caldwell and Company had purchased. The petitioners also allege that Commissioner Saufley, after the transaction, became an employe of Caldwell and Company. Mr. Saufley resigned as insurance commissioner about two years ago and was succeeded by Mr. Allen.

The suit is directed against Rogers Clark Caldwell, James Caldwell, J. Dewitt Carter, Wentworth Caldwell, Caldwell and Company, John Klesbury, Mr. Allen, Mr. Saufley and the Inter-Southern Life Insurance Company.

The petition alleges Caldwell and Company and the other defendants "procured complete domination and control over the minority stockholders of Inter-Southern Life Insurance Company and, by domineering, dismissals, ejections and insinuations, set up a 'dictatorship' of its affairs."

The suit also charges that the defendants "procured the Hon. Bush W. Allen, insurance commissioner of the state of Kentucky, to the state insurance commissioner reluctantly, but finally with some kind of willingness, agreed to the fraudulent transaction here set out."

It is asked that a receiver be appointed immediately to take complete charge of the affairs of the Inter-Southern and to follow the assets, "falsely and fraudulently removed from the depository at Frankfort, and taken from the assets of the Inter-Southern Life Insurance Company by Caldwell and Company, and report his findings to the court."

Caldwell and Company went into receivership a few days ago.

ALLIN, SAUFLEY ANSWER CHARGES MADE IN SUIT

The stock deal which the suit filed in Louisville Friday charges to be illegal was a business transaction concerning only the board of trustees and stockholders of the Inter-Southern Company, and an affair over which the state insurance commissioner had no control; Bush W. Allen told The Herald by long distance telephone from his home at Harrodsburg last night.

SLAYER IS FREED Grand Jury Refuses to Indict "Triangle" Killer

CINCINNATI, Nov. 14 (AP)—Charles King, 43, moving picture operator, who voluntarily surrendered and admitted killing Joseph Colson, 25, of Asheville, N. C., a sign painter, was freed of a murder charge today by the county grand jury, which ignored the case. The defendant claimed self-defense.

King's wife, Mrs. Goldie King, 40, with whom Colson roomed told the grand jury that she came to her home and that she tried to break off their relations. The North Carolina man threatened her life and that of her husband. King then shot Colson to death.
